Dear Parishioners,


On this 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent, we enter into a period known as "Passiontide," which coincides with the last two weeks of Lent. This name comes from the fact that, during this time, we focus very specifically on our Lord's passion and death as a proximate preparation for His resurrection. Providentially, we enter into this liturgical miniseason at a time when our country and our world are suffering a "passiontide" of pestilence.

Our liturgical Passiontide is marked by a couple of very noticeable elements. It is during this part of Lent that we cease using bells at Mass and instead use a harsh-sounding clacker, whose rapping is meant to remind us of the hammer blows that so cruelly crucified our Lord. This is also the time of year that we normally cover our statues with violet shrouds as a way of enhancing our fasting as we prepare for Holy Week. Veiling is meant to clear away any distractions so that we might focus on Jesus who calls us through the cross to a life of holiness. It's also a reminder that Christ's divinity was hidden at the time of His suffering and death. Alas, since we are not having public Masses at this time and likely won't before Easter, we have decided to forego the veiling of our saint statues overlooking our nave and sanctuary because our efforts and resources are being directed to ministering to you, our faithful parishioners, in this time of stress and uncertainty.

As we continue through this pestilential passiontide with COVID-19, let us do so with strong hearts that are courageously united with our Crucified Lord. Let us offer up our sufferings in reparation for our sins and those of the world. Let us look forward toward the glories of the Easter Season, during which we hope that we'll be able to resume our normal lives.

On another note, in the past couple of weeks, a few of you have voiced concerns that St. Ann's has had Mass and offered Holy Communion – fearful that doing so could spread the coronavirus. Please understand that my staff and I are acutely aware of the risks involved, and we have endeavored to take every possible precaution to minimize the risk of spreading the virus with guidance from local doctors and an expert in public health. We have offered Mass as we have with permission from the Diocese, in compliance with CDC recommendations and the Governor's Executive Order. And as I have mentioned at our Masses the past two Sundays, our obligation to attend Sunday Mass is currently suspended by Bishop Jugis, so no one has to attend. Moreover, no one is obliged to receive Holy Communion, and I certainly urge those of you who are most vulnerable to COVID-19 to refrain from Holy Communion and make a Spiritual Communion instead. My goal has been to provide for everyone's spiritual needs and well-being, and to do so in a way that protects your physical well-being. I'm ever mindful of your concerns, grateful for your understanding, pleased for those who came to participate in our Masses, and want to know if we may better minister to those who were unable to be with us.

Let's strive to be united with our Lord in His suffering and death in these next two weeks, and look forward to Easter – even if our celebrations of Holy Week are muted. Let's keep our eyes on God and trust in His mercy. Be assured of my prayers.



A 1st Class Feast Day are many Sundays and major solemnities like Christmas. Feria is a non-feast day and readings typically revert to the prior Sunday readings.

Who is Saint Rocco? Saint Rocco was born of noble parentage about 1340 A.D. in Montpellier, France. At birth it was noted that he had a red cross-shaped birthmark on the left side of his chest. As a young child, San Rocco showed great devotion to God and the Blessed mother. At an early



age, his parents died leaving him an orphan under the care of his uncle, the Duke of Montpellier. Soon after, San Rocco distributed his wealth among the poor and took a vow of poverty.

San Rocco dressed in the clothes of a pilgrim and departed for Rome. At that time, Italy was stricken with a rampant disease. San Rocco cured many of this dreaded disease by praying for them and making the sign of the cross.

During his travels, he too contracted the plague which was evident by an open sore on his leg. Rocco was banished from the city and took refuge in a cave. Here he slept on leaves and drank water from a small stream. Miraculously a dog that refused to eat, faithfully brought him bread as a means of sustenance. The dog used to leave a nearby castle and the Lord of this castle having a curious nature followed this dog into the woods and discovered Rocco. The nobleman had pity on Rocco and brought him to his castle where Rocco was cured.

San Rocco traveled through northern Italy for two or three more years before returning to his birthplace in France. So weak and sick from suffering, the townspeople did not recognize him and he was thrown into jail as a spy without any proof. But yet he was kept in prison for five years. On August 16, 1378, a guard entered his cell and found San Rocco near death. The dungeon was illuminated with a blue light radiating from his body. Upon hearing this, the Governor demanded to know San Rocco's identity. San Rocco faintly replied, I am your nephew Rocco. Only one thing could prove that, so he had him disrobed and the red cross-like mark was visible on the left side of his chest. The Governor and the townspeople present in the cell then believed. A voice from paradise was heard announcing that San Rocco's soul had merited immortal glory in Heaven. Even after his death, San Rocco performed many miracles.

Saint Rocco is venerated in the Roman Catholic Church as the protector against the plague and all contagious diseases. The statue of Saint Rocco is considered unique among theologians because of his pose. It is most unusual because it depicts him with his left hand pointing to an open sore on his left leg. Few images of saints expose any afflictions or handicaps. His body is enclosed in a glass tomb in the church of San Rocco in Venice, Italy.
